## 3 questions for Lent

Our Lord says to give our burdens to him. "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me: for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls." Matthew 11:28

What do You want me to surrender? //What is causing you a lack of peace, anxiety or misgivings?//What sins need to be purged from your life?// Are there relationships or situations in work or friendships that are draining you?//Do you gossip?// What burden of life do you have that cannot be changed, but must be endured to give up to the Lord this Lent?// As St. Francis de Sale said: "Anxiety is the greatest evil that can befall a soul except sin. God commands you to pray, but He forbids you to worry."

What do You want me to hope for? //Who do you need to forgive?// How can you rest in the Lord this season?//How is your prayer life?//What can you give up this Lenten season such as coffee that will help train your body to train you soul?//What prayer practices need restored in your life such as the rosary, even once a week before Mass with your parish family?//Do you need to spend more quiet time with the Lord by taking one of the hours available in our <a href="Perpetual Adoration Chapel?">Perpetual Adoration Chapel?</a>//How can your soul rest in the Lord?

## What is the Yoke?

One of the most read verses in Matthew's Gospel presents us with a question of "What is the yoke?"

It's easy to dismiss Bible verses we don't understand. However, this verse is about so much more than a yoke used in farming. It's about Christ's Cross in a profound way.

The original Webster's 1828 Dictionary defines yoke as: A piece of timber, hollowed or made curving near each end, and fitted with bows for receiving the necks of oxen; by which means two are connected for drawing.



Those in farming know that yoking makes the job easier. The oxen worked together with the yoke giving them balance and helping them pull the plow or cart. Christ used an everyday tool to present a spiritual message:

Our daily burdens and crosses are manageable when we carry them with Him. If we are yoked to Him our sufferings and disappointments take on deeper meaning to let our souls rest in Christ's cross.

The yoke is an invitation to Divine Life with Christ. Christ carried a beam of wood across his shoulders. He knows our fears and limitations but He asks us to take up our cross with Him. We don't have to do it alone because by His Holy Cross He redeemed the World.

# WE ADORE YOU O CHRIST AND WE PRAISE YOU BECAUSE BY YOUR HOLY CROSS YOU HAVE REDEEMED THE WORLD

## DID YOU KNOW?

It was St. Francis of Assisi who first uttered the above words that are now said throughout all Catholic Churches of the world for the Stations of the Cross.

Why: Whenever St. Francis saw a Catholic church in the distance he would kneel down and give praise to God. Often he would say the following words that he passed on to his friars.

"We adore you, O Lord Jesus Christ, in this church and all the churches of the world, and we bless you, because by your holy Cross you have redeemed the world." Amen

How: This little prayer was used by Franciscans for many centuries and over time it was adapted to become a "standard" prayer in the popular devotion known as the Stations of the Cross. Franciscans spread this devotion throughout Europe and the United States.

**What:** The prayer is shortened to say, "We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you, (or praise you) because, by your holy Cross you have redeemed the world.


